Recycling

Let's recycle some of those questionable household items.

Here in Wareham we do not and cannot recycle wax coated boxes like those for juice, broth, milk, etc. In Western Massachusetts they do have the facilities to recycle these items, but again we do not.

What about those pizza boxes? I have recycled in other towns as well as in Wareham and been told "no pizza boxes" because of the greasy residue. We even give that same information at our center. However I learned at a recent tour of the Total Waste facility that as long as there is no food or greasy paper in the box, those pizza boxes are recyclable with cardboard.

Those nightmare plastic bags are, according to a VERY reliable source, 100% recyclable. The problem is that when they enter the "stream" the become "wrappable" and clog the machinery that sorts. In our area you must return these bags to a vendor who recycles them properly. Shaws used to be such a location but they seem to have bowed out. I am looking for another location.
