Simple Rooting Workshop

We will be using a rooting hormone to develop roots on shrubs. This is one way to identically replicate a plant. Bring your own 4" pot. Just make sure it is washed in bleach solution and rinsed very well. I have potting mix and rooting hormone. Bring your own if you prefer.

I have a variety of shrubs that can be cut or you can bring a cutting from your yard. Cut a 5 -6 inch piece off of your shrub that day. Wrap it in very damp paper towels, then put in a plastic bag. Bring it along.

The shrubs that root this way include boxwood, forsythia, skimmia, bay, leucothoe, kowalski and hydrangeas.

There is room in my driveway for about 6 cars. You can park on Great Neck Road if you pull in a bit. Please don't drive on the daylilies.

I have a second, non paved "driveway" at the other end of my front yard. I will pull my car in there with room for another. You can carpool to both Jessica Parr's house and mine if you park in one of the businesses at Great Neck, Depot, and Minot.

Please do not park in #63 driveway, next to mine.
