Conservation and Education

Try experimenting this summer. Put cuttings in water. If they start to root, put in potting mix. Pick up some rooting hormone for stubborn specimens.

Take pictures of your flowers. That way you will be able to pot up irises in August and label them with the color. Daylilies can be potted up anytime, even when blooming. Take a pic and label with the color.

Learn a weed or two for identification. One that just went by is hairy bittercress. It has exploding seed capsules. Pokeweed is coming up now. Google pictures of them



both to see what they look like.

Wareham Garden Club Memorial Garden

Connie took this picture of our Memorial Garden. Thanks to Judy Weatherby and her team, it always looks lovely.

Here is a bit of recent history of our Memorial Garden, courtesy of Christine Decas:

"I remember the Memorial Garden area as an empty area with a large stone in the center. The copper sign was added to the stone and a few plantings were added. The Civic Committee added a round rock border to protect the plants from the lawn mowers and added a few more plants. The memorial bricks were scattered in front of the large rock.

I think it was 2014 when Cheri Ikasalo was President of the Garden Club, I saw a pic-



ture in the newspaper of a mosaic design inlay in cement—it was titled "River of Tears". With that as inspiration, Cheri, her husband Paul and I collected rocks at the Marion dump (construction debris site) and used them to form a teardrop outline from the base of the rock outward. We then purchased bags of stones at Home Depot filling in the teardrop and then added the memorial bricks within the teardrop.

While working on the site one day, a gentleman stopped by and said he had a slab of stone that he had not used and asked if we wanted a bench added to the site. A day later, the bench was put in place. I am sorry but I do not recall his name but he said he drives by daily and lives at Burgess Point.

It really "takes a village" and in this case it takes a garden club to create a peaceful site of beauty. Many members have helped create the memorial garden, but no one has been more dedicated to it's maintenance than Judy Weatherby who has weeded, watered and planted seasonally for many years."
