A few words from the Recycle Corner. As you clean your closets remember to repurpose that winter footwear for bird hideouts, feeders and "crazy" plant hangers!

I saw some useful information and something I have been unaware of. Do not recycle anything smaller than a credit card because it clogs all of that recycling equipment. I always thought I was doing a good thing by removing the plastic caps from waxed milk cartons and the like, but not at all. These small items get jammed up in machinery and stop the process from working. It is better to leave the cap ( or the tab) on the items even if it ends up in the trash.

We still have no date for a shredding event and I am still searching for a place to recycle the already shredded paper I have. These events are extremely expensive. I will let you know as soon as I have an answer.
