## October Hikes

- We will meet at 9am at Hynes Field in Onset to carpool.

- Bring water, bug spray, and wear light-colored clothes.

#### TUESDAY, October 10th, Tweedy and Barnes Conservation Area, Blackmore Pond Rd, Wareham

Parking at site off road on left after sign. Explore woods, bogs, and wetlands and may see a fox or deer on the .8 mile trail loop, considered easy. Bring bug spray and boots as it is generally a wet area. Should see some fall foliage.

#### TUESDAY, October 17th, The Knob, Woods Hole, Falmouth

Located near the Quissett Harbor House. Parking limited off road. It continues to be a major attraction to the public for its nature walk, birding, marsh coastal bank ,and spectacular views of Quissett Harbor and Buzzards Bay. Follow signs and keep to right side path.

#### TUESDAY, October 24th, Cornell fArm, 520 Smith Neck Road, South Dartmouth

Roam from pasture to small woodland before getting to serene salt marsh near the head of the Tidal Little River. A quaint farm with sweeping views and nature trails. Nice quiet woods with 2 miles of in and out trails with boardwalks, and connects to DNRT for more hiking. It will be muddy after rains.

#### TUESDAY, October 31, Allens Pond Wildlife Sancutary, 1280 Horseneck Road, Dartmouth

There are 3 trails systems within this area. First the Quansett Trail Loop, then on the way back, we will take the Beach Loop Trail which has dramatic water views and see many salt marcs birds and thriving native plants. The loop follows a rocky trails that requires walking on these rocks so be aware. It is fun and adventurous. On another day we can take a different trail through fields and bogs. Moderate hiking.

## **Design Workshop**

Our first design workshop will be **Wednesday**, **October 11**, **2023**. Because the library is replacing the carpet, I have offered to have this design class at my home at 8 Cranberry Lane, East Wareham at 9:30 AM.
